## **Association News**

"Extinction gives us a taste of how lovely Oxford Street could be"



Well it also gave us a taste of how horrible the areas surrounding Oxford Street could be if the Mayor had not been stopped last year from inflicting his vanity project on the West End.

It was difficult to find anything written by Joy Lo Dico in her Evening Standard article that was actually correct. It was quite clear that her vision extends no further than Oxford Street itself. The whole of Central London was closed down, not just Oxford Street, it was for 2 weeks, at least at Marble Arch, not one week. Crossrail numbers will not jump up on the day it opens, the projected increases, if correct are over a 5 to 10 year period. The £350 projected expenditure is for the West End district, not Oxford Street alone. By dismissing the 25% claimed drop in footfall suffered by the shops as businesses "obsessing" she only demonstrates how out of touch she is with the real world.

Further by claiming buses were only needed because it was not pleasant to walk displayed nothing but Ms Lo Dico's arrogance in only considering those in her own demographic, the young and fit with plenty of time to spare. It obviously did not occur to her that the elderly, the infirm, those with small children, those with shopping, those that have to work in the area all need buses to get to and through Oxford Street.

Ms Lo Dico might have been breathing cleaner air, but those that actually live in the surrounding areas were certainly not. For them the nightmare of clogged roads and massive increases in pollution and inability to get in and out of the area confirmed their worst fears regarding the Mayor's ill considered pedestrianisation proposals.

She urges Westminster to listen again to public sentiment - what does she think they were doing last year? It was by listening to public sentiment that Westminster put a stop to a scheme which would have inflicted irreparable damage to the West End, both its business and those that live in it. And for that they are to be applauded.

Has Marylebone got at Banksy (again)?

A suspected new Banksy artwork has appeared at Marble Arch amid speculation the street artist has backed the Extinction Rebellion protests. The artwork, which has yet to be confirmed as Banksy's, materialised overnight at the base of the climate activists' recent protests. Alongside the image of a child with the Extinction Rebellion emblem, it reads: "From this moment despair ends and tactics begin." If it turns out to be genuine then it looks like the Council will keep it. Ten years ago the Council took a different view under Robert Davis when a Bansky appeared on Newman Street in Fitzrovia. Banksy has painted at Marble Arch

before in the old underpasses using the slogan "What are you looking at?" appeared overnight opposite a CCTV camera.

## No date for Bond Street Crossrail Station

Crossrail (Elizabeth Line) will open between October 2020 and March 2021 but without Bond Street. No date has been set for when Bond Street Station will open much to the annoyance of local residents and businesses. The line was meant to open in December 2018 and the delay was only announced at end of August.

## Marylebone Forum AGM

To be a local 'forum' for businesses, residents and key stakeholders to exchange ideas and lobby with a forceful, shared voice.

The AGM is your opportunity to hear from the current Committee about progress made over the past year, and plans for the forthcoming year, and to elect Forum Committee members and Officers. ## The Marylebone Low Emission Neighbourhood

The Marylebone Low Emission Neighbourhood (LEN) project draws to a close, and the Council are seeking your participation in a short survey (eight questions) to evaluate the project <a href="here">here</a>. The diesel car parking surcharge, which was piloted across F zone (initiated by the Marylebone LEN), will be implemented across the City later in the year. Thanks to the funds raised from the pilot scheme, Bryanston and Dorset Square Schools have benefited from projects financed by the Schools' Clean Air Fund.
